Sample Quantitative Questions

(Difficulty level will remain between low and medium)

1. If $u > t$, $r > q$, $s > t$, and $t > r$, which of the following must be true?

1. $u > s$
2. $s > q$
3. $u > r$

- A. 1 only
- B. 2 only
- C. 3 only
- D. 1 and 2
- E. 2 and 3

2. A particular company made a profit of \$4.5 million in 1991. What was the value of its profit in 1993?

1. The company earned 10 percent less profit in 1991 than in 1993
2. In 1991, the company's profit was \$4.5 million less than in 1993

A Statement (1) ALONE is sufficient to answer the question, but statement (2) alone is not sufficient.
